

you can rest assured that this good work that Dave helped to start and lead, will go on uninterrupted with the original vision fully intact.


As we move forward in this mission, I have moved into the role of CEO. Your support and prayers will be greatly appreciated. God Bless you all.

History of Revenue Growth & Allocation (Graph A)



For the year ending December 31, 2021, Orphan's Lifeline International experienced an increase in revenues of 24%. One-time and monthly donations increased. Special needs and project motivated revenues increased significantly due to the introduction of a new program building homes for orphans and widows in Kenya.

We anticipate growth to be moderate in 2022.


Donor retention remained at approximately 98% and Orphan's Lifeline had a record number of new donors again in 2021.

Special needs requests were all met and funds were passed through at 100% to each designated need.

OUR YEAR IN REVIEW

2021 was a year in which once again, many special needs were fulfilled. Just a few examples are:

Safe Home, Liberia – Medical facility was completed and a new school was built.

Home of Champions – This home became a model facility in the eyes of local authorities as OLI continued to improve the facility and programs including the purchase of a vehicle for transportation of children, a new licensing requirement for children's homes in Kenya.

Butiki – Tuitions for several college students as well as medical needs.

Life of Favor / Freshfire – Funds for several older children in college as well as repairs, medical assistance for individuals and other needs.

Learning Estate, India – Medical needs as well as a new motorcycle for transportation of children and procurement of goods needed for the home.

Rose of Sharon, India – Rose of Sharon was given extra funds to help families with food and PPE in the area around the Children's Home. Rose of Sharon also had to deliver food and all other needs to the temporary residences that the children were in due to government COVID regulations. This was a repeat of 2020.

Errabalem - Many of the children that live at the home were forced to live with relatives or neighbors during the lockdown by government regulation. So, food, clothing, and all other needs were delivered to their temporary residence in 2021 as we did in 2020.

CCIM, India – Many of the children that live at the CCIM Home were forced to live with relatives or neighbors during the lockdown in 2021 due to government regulation. So, food, clothing, and all other needs were delivered to their temporary residence.

Amazing Grace – Beyond regular care, Amazing Grace received funds for several children with medical needs as well as college tuition for several young adult children in the home once again. Early in 2022, a new home will be built to replace one with severe damage from a recent hurricane.

Nantale's Children's Home, Uganda- OLI paid for tutors for in home schooling due to lockdowns and continued expanding vocational skills as well.

Russia: We continued to provide for the orphan children facilities in the Kabarovsk Krai Region. The focus in 2021 was the same as the year prior with facility upgrades, general needs, vocational trades training and a new focus on outreach to the elderly and poor by the orphans themselves.

In Barnaul, where the facilities we care for have no opportunity for such infrastructure, the focus remained the same; as orphanages and hospitals received food, clothing, medical supplies and medical equipment.

Kenya

Per our 2020 Annual Report in which we introduced our plans for a new program, said program was initiated with great success. In a partnership with a Church of Christ congregation and charity in Kenya, Orphan' Lifeline funded and initiated the building of 9 new homes for orphans and widows. We currently have funding for 14 more! These homes are fully furnished with beds, couches, tables and chairs. These homes replaced the tiny mud huts these families were living in, providing a safe, clean home for these widows to raise their fatherless children in. In addition, 11 orphan and widow families (with 3 to 5 children) were fully sponsored, providing the funds for the same level of care that we provide in our children's homes.

Thousands of children were cared for in all of Orphan's Lifeline Children's Homes, widow families and community aid programs every day in 9 countries. They were provided with food, clothing, medical care, education and spiritual instruction every day. Many children graduated from the homes and moved on to jobs or continuing higher education.

New children were taken off the streets and are being given the same life-saving and lifechanging opportunities as their predecessors.

GOALS IN 2022

This year will see the continuation of Orphan's Lifeline's current programs as well as the expansion of our new Orphan and Widow program in Kenya and now India as well, with a focus on families with girls in them. We are also planning on building, a new children's home specifically for girls in India as the government forces separation of boys from girls. This is a critical need as uneducated and uncared for females are subject to trafficking, abuse and even in general, poor treatment within their culture. This project will be subject to approval by the government which has become shy of such homes for girls, even though they have no solution themselves. That is why the orphan and widow program is also critically important!
